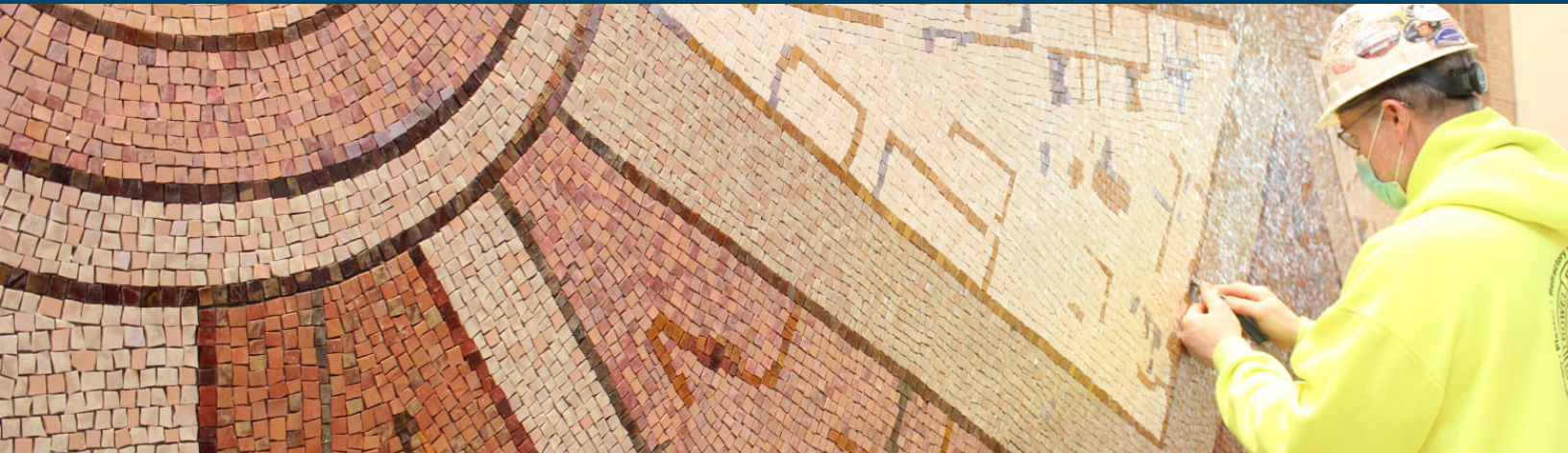

Assemble boilers, tanks, vats, and pressure vessels according to blueprint specifications, using power tools and hand tools. The duties of the boilermaker include welding, acetylene burning, riveting, caulking, rigging, fitting up, grounding, reaming, and impact machine operating. Construction and repair of utility plants, chemical plants, automotive plants, refineries, paper and steel manufacturing facilities, ore processing, and mine plants throughout the entire State of Michigan.

Length of Program

The apprenticeship program spans four years.

Their skills are employed on a wide range of construction projects, from homes to skyscrapers, tunnels to bridges, and highways to monuments.

Millwrights: A millwright is a skilled craftsman in the industrial construction industry. Their expertise is in the art of moving, installing, aligning, and leveling machinery and conveyor systems in a safe, efficient, and precise manner.

Four-year apprenticeship, classes one day every two weeks.

Cement Masons smooth and finish the surfaces of poured concrete floors, walls, sidewalks, and curbs, using hand and power tools.

Plasterers typically apply coats of plaster to interior walls, ceilings, and partitions in buildings to produce finished surfaces. They can install or produce decorative panels, cornices, and moldings. You'll also find them restoring elaborate historic buildings, and even working on sets for video and theatrical productions.

Length of Program

The apprenticeship generally spans 3 years or 3600 hours in length. Plasterers attend classes one day every 2 weeks while Cement Mason training is held during the winter months.

Scope of Work

The work of Electrical Construction Workers (Inside Wiremen) can be divided into broad categories such as new construction, remodeling, maintenance, and repair. While the jobs differ, the mental and physical skills acquired in a properly designed and administered training program prepare the electrical worker for this entire range of work.

During a career as an electrical construction worker, a person will likely be involved in many different types of jobs presenting many new and different challenges, working with his or her hands as well as with their mind. Much of the work involves installation, assembling, testing, repairing, layout, and design of electrical wiring, fixtures, and apparatus used for power, light, heating, air conditioning, and many types of control systems. Many jobs now incorporate computers. Due to the nature of the work, above-average math and reading skills are essential.

Scope of Work

The work of the insulators today covers industrial, commercial, transportation and cryogenics. Industrial applies to all types of industries such as chemical process and petrochemical. The commercial field includes building, building services and refrigerated spaces. Transportation includes the insulation of trucks, trailers, railroad cars and ships. Cryogenics is the field of low temperature service, such as required by liquefied gases. The insulators worker today works with many types of materials, such as fiberglass, cork and calcium silicate. They insulate hot and cold piping, refrigerant lines, duct work boilers and tanks.

4-year apprenticeship, one evening a week (approximately September through May).

Iron Workers erect structural steel and precast concrete as well as place reinforcing steel bars and cables in concrete construction. They move, rig and erect machinery, and install fabricated building components. You'll find them placing a variety of ornamental steel, aluminum, and other building components — such as stairways, catwalks, grating, grills, conveyors and screens — all the while maintaining tolerances specified in building plans.

Length of Program

The apprenticeship generally spans four years, with class held for one day every two weeks, and the remainder of the training occurring on the job.

Scope of Work

Operating Engineers operate and maintain heavy and portable construction equipment. They are the men and women who run bulldozers and scrapers on highway projects, cranes on building projects, hydraulic backhoes on sewer and water line installations, as well as large machines like asphalt plants. Their work is often seasonal in nature with considerable exposure to weather, especially when their machinery has an open cab.

Length of Program

The apprenticeship program spans approximately four years with 6,000 hours of both on-the-job and classroom training.

Work includes indoor and outdoor work, brush/roller/spray, with most work being more than 10' off the ground (towers, tall buildings, etc.). Painters prepare surfaces of buildings and other structures and then apply paint by means of brushes, rollers or sprayers. Work with varnish, enamels, lacquer and other materials. May also paint interior rooms or cover walls with paper, fabrics, vinyls or other materials (paperhanger). The painters must be able to mix paints as well as do sandblasting and waterblasting.

Three-year apprenticeship program, 4 hours per week (day or evening).

Plumbers

Responsible for the installation of water line systems to kitchens, bathrooms, lavatories, etc., in residential, commercial, and industrial buildings. Also install natural gas and air lines. Assemble, install and repair pipes, fittings, and fixtures according to specifications and plumbing codes. Measure, cut, thread, bend, install, and tests pipes and pipefittings. Work according to blueprints, specifications, and working drawings to perform the work required in the sequence of installations.

Pipefitters

Install piping systems that carry hot water, steam, air, or other liquids or gases needed for industrial production, or other uses. Install both high or low-pressure systems, especially in industrial and commercial buildings. Lay out, fabricate and assemble pipes from drawings, blueprints, and specifications. They also work on pipes for heating and cooling systems and install automatic fire sprinkler systems in buildings.

Roofers are also called on to waterproof and damp-proof walls and other building surfaces.

APPRENTICE READINESS PROGRAMS

If you are looking to get into a building trades union, ARP is the perfect opportunity for you.

Apprentice Readiness Programs or ARP, are designed to assist people to prepare to be successful in applying to one of the construction trades programs in Michigan.

The curriculum is taught by professionals and may include the following: Safety training (OSHA 30); Construction math; Proficiency in using construction tools and equipment; trades and job site orientation; building a suitable resume, financial literacy, and more. The experience gained in ARP prepares people to enter the construction workforce in Michigan with the skills, knowledge, and confidence to succeed in the construction trades.

ARPs are generally developed to assist challenged segments of the population: women, people of color, veterans, and the under-employed.
